Conference highlights included the Sponsors' Evening, the coinciding of the annual Seafarers Memorial Service at St John's Cathedral in Brisbane which was led by our Chaplain The Rev'd Stephen Briggs. The service was attended by global MTS Secretary General Andrew Wright who also led parts of the service.

The conference dinner was another success. Big thanks to the Royal Australian Navy for hosting the dinner at HMAS Moreton on the banks of the Brisbane River. It is believed to be the first non-naval event to be held there.

Bill a help to seafarers

A RABY Bay priest has been honoured by the highest figure in the Brisbane Anglican church for 45 years of service to the Mission to Seafarers, including his work helping to honour fallen sailors.

Father Bill Pearson was presented with a certificate by Brisbane archbishop Phillip Aspinall at the annual seafarers' memorial service last month, which also marked his retirement from the Seafarers' Day committee.

It came as he prepares to celebrate 60 years in the church, having been ordained as a deacon in Townsville on December 6, 1959.

"That happened to be the feast day of Saint Nicholas, patron saint of sailors (who was) the dedication saint of the Mission to Seafarers chapel that I was to be in charge of for the next three years," he said.

He said he had always had a connection to the sea, having been born in the great British seafaring city of Liverpool.

After serving with the navy and in various Queensland parishes for nearly three decades, he was recalled to Mission to Seafarers as a senior chaplain and head of the Mission to Seafarers Brisbane.

"The great shock for me when I returned to the MTS was containers," he said.

"In Townsville it was common for general cargo vessels to be in port for at least two weeks, not the few hours of today."

In his job, Father Bill provided spiritual support for seafarers who often spent long periods away from home.

"The mission in Townsville was open from 10am to 10pm ... 365 days," he said.

"The weekly program was three nights dances, partners provided by the Ladies' Harbour Lights Guild, with the other four nights movies."

The mission consisted of a hall, lounge, chapel, canteen and library and Father Bill and his family lived in the flat within the complex.

Wife Lorna kept the mission opening during the day while Father Bill was out fulfilling his other chaplaincy duties.

He also visited about 300 ships per year, as well as hospitals, jails and watch houses.

He was appointed Chaplain Emeritus by The Mission to Seafarers president Captain Dave Ellis in 2016.

Caring for seafarers has long been a role for churches of all denominations.

Mission's Chaplain Emeritus Father Bill Pearson has been honoured by the Anglican Church for his 45 years of service to the Mission to Seafarers and 60 years' service to the church.

As you can read in the newspaper article below, Father Bill was presented with a certificate of recognition by Archbishop Dr Phillip Aspinall at the annual Seafarers' Memorial Service held in Brisbane's St John's Cathedral.

Father Bill told the newspaper he has a long-time connection with the sea having been born in Liverpool in the UK, serving with the Navy as well as work with the MTS in Townsville and in Brisbane.

Congratulations Father Bill.

President addresses maritime leaders

Ship owners and chief players in Australia's maritime industry have a better understanding of the challenging lives that international seafarers lead on the world's oceans and of the great support they receive by the Mission to Seafarers.

President Ross Nicholls spoke to them at the Pacific 2019 Conference in Sydney in early October about the life of a seafarers and the increased pressure they are under as aspects of their work become automated and the industry looks to cut costs even further.

Ross said seafarers were under pressure to work even harder to keep their jobs, which poses greater physical and mental challenges. Technology enables seafarers to easily talk to and see their families from remote places but it has been found that the downside to this can be greater depression and even suicide when they have to say good bye and not see them or hear their voices, again and again.

Memorial Service donation

The Annual Seafarers Memorial Service held at St John's Anglican Cathedral in Brisbane afforded a solemn yet cheerful opportunity to remember the thousands of seafarers who sail the world's oceans and those who went before them. A link to the service can be found on facebook

New cruise ship initiative

Thanks to the hard work of our staff and volunteers we have been able to expand our service to seafarers visiting Brisbane to include crews from cruise ships.

As you know each year cruise ships dock near our centre at the Grain Terminal.

Supervisor Jacque and volunteer Maureen initiated the move to greet cruise ship crews and transport them to the centre for some R and R.

The centre has been overwhelmed by the positive response from cruise ship seafarers, often left with very little time and services during their short stay port calls. The cruise ship season in Brisbane commences during the end of November and runs through to early April.



First CPE graduate celebrated



Brisbane MTS has played a big role in growing the pastoral care education of trainee Anglican Priest, Gary Tognola. Gary is the first recipient of the Milford Eyres Bursary. The bursary was set up a few years ago following a bequest from mission supporter, ship's Captain and Great Barrier Reef and Torres Strait Pilot, Captain Milford Eyres to enable trainee priests to assist the development and training of people to work in the maritime sector and to also benefit the mission.

It was recognised that sponsoring a CPE student with work experience gained at the seafarers centre would likely address both of these requirements.

Gary was the first recipient and has developed his CPE knowledge around the maritime industry and will hopefully continue to volunteer at the Brisbane seafarers centre. He is continuing his studies and after completing 100 hours assisting our volunteers and staff and working with seafarers he now has unique understanding of a very special community of global workers.
